DAREBIN CLIMATE EMERGENCY CONSULTATION FINDINGS

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Council is developing our new Climate Emergency Strategy that will set out an ambitious pathway to reducing climate emissions by 2030.


To help us understand what our community wants to see we consulted with 1011 people who live, work or play in Darebin between August and October 2022. 467 people completed our survey and we ran 35 in person workshops to reach another 544 people.

This is what they told us.




Who participated?

77% of all survey respondents and workshop participants live in Darebin. 23% live in surrounding suburbs such as Coburg, Heidelberg and Clifton Hill but work, visit or play in Darebin.



By activity and location

We know that surveys don't work for everyone so we attended 35 workshops and other events to make sure we reached a wide range of people. Therefore workshops and other opportunities to talk about the issues in the survey were prioritised in some areas.



How can we prepare buildings and land in Darebin to better respond to a changing climate?

Support projects to help reduce temperatures in our neighbourhoods (e.g. increase trees, more green open space, lighter colours for buildings and hard surfaces)

Revise Darebin's planning and building standards to better withstand impacts from climate change

Improve reliability of local power supply (e.g. through batteries, locally produced renewable energy) to reduce risks of blackouts during high temperature and times when energy use is high)

Increase the use of alternative water sources (e.g. rainwater tanks) to help during hotter tempratures and periods of drought

Improve reliability and useability of transport systems during extreme weather conditions

ABORIGINAL AND TORRES STRAIT ISLANDER PEOPLE AND THE CLIMATE EMERGENCY

Darebin City Council acknowledges the Wurundjeri Woi Wurrung people as the Traditional Owners and custodians of the land and waters we now call Darebin, and that sovereignty has never been ceded.

This acknowledgement and meaningful engagement with Traditional Owners and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in our community was a significant gap in the first Climate Emergency Plan. We recognise that climate change has impacted and continues to threaten country and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. There is important indigenous knowledge and experience that needs to be considered to heal country and protect community as we approach the challenge of the climate emergency together.

Council wishes to reaffirm its commitment to working closely with and alongside the Traditional Owners, the Darebin Aboriginal Advisory Committee and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in Darebin on the new Climate Emergency Strategy and Action Plan.
